Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) Policy

The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) applies to children from birth to the end of the Reception year. At Abram Bryn Gates School, children join the Reception class in the year that they turn five. In partnership with parents and carers we enable the children to begin the process of becoming active learners for life.

We endeavour to ensure that children "learn and develop well and are kept healthy and safe." We aim to support children in their learning through "teaching and experiences that gives children the broad range of skills that provide the right foundation for good progress through school and in life." (Statutory Framework for the EYFS 2014)

The EYFS is based upon four principles:

- A unique child - developing resilient, capable, confident and self-assured individuals.
- Positive relationships - supporting the children in becoming strong and independent.
- Enabling environments - where opportunities and experiences respond to the individual needs of the child by developing a strong partnership between practitioners, parents/carers and the child.
- Learning and developing - An acknowledgement that children learn in different ways and at different rates.

A Unique Child

We recognise that every child is a competent learner who can be resilient, capable, confident and self-assured. We recognise that children develop in individual ways, at varying rates. Children's attitudes and dispositions to learning are influenced by feedback from others; we use praise and encouragement, as well as 'Top Table', 'Well Done' assemblies and rewards, to encourage children to develop a positive attitude to learning.

Inclusion/Special Educational Needs (SEN)

All children and their families are valued at Abram Bryn Gates. Children are treated as individuals and have equal access to all provisions available. All children are encouraged to achieve their personal best and planning is adapted to meet the needs of all groups and abilities. Assessments take into account contributions from a range of perspectives to ensure that any child with potential special educational

needs is identified at the earliest possible opportunity. Early identification of special needs is crucial to enable staff to support the development of each child. Concerns are always discussed with parents/carers at an early stage.

We meet the needs of all our children through:

- Planning opportunities that build upon and extend children's knowledge, experience and interests, and develop their self-esteem and confidence;
- Using a wide range of teaching strategies based on children's learning needs;
- Providing a wide range of opportunities to motivate and support children and to help them to learn effectively;
- Providing a safe and supportive learning environment in which the contribution of all children is valued;
- Using resources which reflect diversity and are free from discrimination and stereotyping;
- Planning challenging activities for children whose ability and understanding are in advance of their language and communication skills;
- Monitoring children's progress and taking action to provide support as necessary.

Welfare

It is important to us that all children in our school are 'safe'. We aim to educate children on boundaries, rules and limits and to help them understand why they exist. We provide children with choices to help them develop this important life skill. Children should be allowed to take risks, but need to be taught how to recognise and avoid hazards. We aim to protect the physical and psychological well-being of all our children.

"Children learn best when they are healthy, safe and secure, when their individual needs are met and when they have positive relationships with the adults caring for them."

At Abram Bryn Gates we understand that we are legally required to comply with certain welfare requirements as stated in the Statutory Framework for Early Years Foundation Stage 2014. We understand that we are required to:

- Promote the welfare and safeguarding of children.
- Promote good health, preventing the spread of infection and taking appropriate action when children are ill.
- Manage behaviour effectively in a manner appropriate for the children's stage of development and individual needs.

- Ensure all adults who look after the children or who have unsupervised access to them are suitable to do so.
- Ensure that the premises, furniture and equipment is safe and suitable for purpose
- Ensure that every child receives enjoyable and challenging learning and development experiences tailored to meet their needs.
- Maintain records, policies and procedures required for safe efficient management of the setting and to meet the needs of the children.

Positive Relationships

At Abram Bryn Gates we recognise that children learn to be strong and independent from secure relationships. We aim to develop caring, respectful, professional relationships with the children and their families.

Parents as Partners

We recognise that parents are children's first and most enduring educators and we value the contribution they make. We recognise the role that parents have played, and their future role, in educating the children. We do this through:

- An information evening for parents in June before their children start school in September
- Talking to parents about their child before their child starts in our school, through Home visits
- Inviting parents to attend informal meetings providing information about areas of the curriculum e.g. Early Reading, Maths and Phonics.
- Holding meetings to explain Orbit and follow up drop in workshop sessions to give any extra support needed.
- A formal meeting for parents twice a year at which the teacher and the parent discuss the child's progress in private. Parents receive a report on their child's attainment and progress at the end of the school year.
- Organising a range of activities throughout the year that encourage collaboration between child, school and parents / carers, e.g. Sports Day, Christmas Production.
- Inviting parents / carers to make comments through 'Wow Slips' and Orbit relating to the children's achievements out of school.
- Written contact through reading diaries as well as the acknowledgement parents can ring school to contact staff.

- Offering parents / carers regular opportunities to chat informally at the beginning or end of the school day about their child. Parents / carers are made aware of the curriculum and other activities through the parents' notice board along with any other relevant messages or information.

All staff involved with the EYFS aim to develop good relationships with all children, interacting positively with them and taking time to listen to them. At our school, the EYFS teacher acts as the 'Key Person' to all children in EYFS, supported by the other practitioners.

Enabling Environments

We aim to create an attractive and stimulating learning environment where children feel confident and secure and challenged. The children have daily access to an indoor and outdoor environment that is set up with planned continuous provision.

Effective learning builds and extends upon prior learning and following children's interest. Effective planning is informed by observations of the children to ensure we follow their current interests and experiences. These observations are recorded in the Children's Learning Journey's.

Play based learning is paramount and children direct their own learning from carefully planned opportunities provided by staff. Staff will enhance play and extend as needed to further individual learning.

Observation Assessment and Planning

At Abram Bryn Gates we use School Pupil Tracker Online to track the progress of pupils through the Early Years Outcomes attainment bands. This information feeds into the formal reporting of attainment at the end of the Reception Year through the E.Y.F.S. Profile.

From September 2015 Reception Children have been assessed using the C.E.M. Baseline Assessment during the first 6 weeks of school. They are assessed against learning statements in Maths, Literacy and P.S.E.D to determine a starting point for their future learning

The planning within the E.Y.F.S is based around half termly themes. These plans are used as a guide for weekly planning; however the teacher may alter these in response to the needs (achievements and interests) of the children. These changes will be indicated on weekly planning.

We make regular assessments of children's learning and use this information to ensure that future planning reflects identified needs. Assessment in the E.Y.F.S. takes the form of both formal and informal observations and this involves teachers and other adults. These observations are recorded in the Children's Learning Journey's and include information and observations from parents and other carers.

Learning and Development

There are seven areas of learning and development of which three are "prime areas," and four "specific areas."

The prime areas are:

- Communication and language
- Physical development
- Personal, social and emotional development.

The specific areas are:

- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding of the world and
- Expressive arts and design

Through careful assessments and observations, including information provided by parents and other settings, children's development levels are assessed. The balance will shift towards a more equal focus on all areas of learning as children grow in confidence and ability within the three prime areas. However, if a child's progress in any prime area gives cause for concern, staff will discuss this with the child's parents and/or carers and agree how to support the child.

At Abram Bryn Gates: "Each area of learning and development is implemented through planned, purposeful play and through a mix of adult-led and child-initiated activity."

Play is used as an essential part children's development, building their confidence as they learn to explore, to think about problems, and relate to others. Children learn by leading their own play, and by taking part in play which is guided by adults. There is an on-going judgement to be made by practitioners about the balance between activities led by children, and activities led or guided by adults.

Practitioners must respond to each child's emerging needs and interests, guiding their development through warm, positive interaction. As children grow older, and as their development allows, it is expected that the balance will gradually shift towards more activities led by adults, to help children prepare for more formal learning, ready for Year 1. (Statutory Framework for EYFS 2014)

Planning and guided children's activities will reflect on the different ways that children learn and reflect these in their practice. At Abram Bryn Gates we support children in using the three characteristics of effective teaching and learning.

These are;

- **Playing and exploring** - children investigate and experience things, and 'have a go'.
- **Active learning** - children concentrate and keep on trying if they encounter difficulties, and enjoy their achievements.
- **Creating and thinking critically** - children have their own ideas develop them, make links between ideas, and develop strategies for doing things.

(Taken from statutory framework for the EYFS 2014)

Religious Education and PSHE is also taught in the reception classes following the Wigan Agreed Syllabus and SEAL guidelines.

Equal Opportunities

All members of the school are treated as individuals. We aim to meet the needs of all, taking account of gender, ability, ethnicity, culture, religion, language, special educational needs, disability, and social circumstances. All staff are aware of the need for the curriculum to reflect cultural diversity and the need to prepare pupils for life in a diverse and multi-faith society.

Health and Safety

At Abram Bryn Gates there are clear procedures for assessing risk which includes procedures for keeping children safe during outings and for any aspects of the environment or provision that may require a further risk assessment.

In line with the EYFS statutory framework 2014, at Abram Bryn Gates we undertake;

- A whole school medicines policy ensuring that there are systems in place to ensure that medicines and the systems for obtaining information about a child's needs for medication are kept up to date. Medicines will not be administered unless they have been prescribed by a doctor. Training is provided for staff

where the administration of medicine requires medical or technical knowledge. Medicines (both prescription and non-prescription) are only administered to a child where written permission for that particular medicine has been obtained from the child's parent and/or carer. At Abram Bryn Gates a written record is kept each time a medicine is administered to a child and informs the child's parents and/or carers on the same day." (Statutory framework for EYFS 2014)

- Fresh drinking water is available at all times.
- Children's' dietary needs are recorded and acted upon when required.
- Toast and juice are available during the morning session and fruit in the afternoon.
- A first aider is accessible at all times and a record of accidents and injuries is kept.
- A fire and emergency evacuation procedure and policy
- A safeguarding policy stating how mobile phones and cameras are to be used and stored securely whilst children are in the setting. Cameras that are used in school must not be used for staff own personal use.

The Learning Environment

The Reception classroom is organized to allow children to explore and learn securely and safely. There are areas where the children can be active or take things more quietly. The classroom covers all areas of learning, where children are able to find and locate equipment and resources independently. The Reception class has its own enclosed outdoor area which includes a covered area accessed through the classroom. In addition reception has shared access to the tyre Park, the school field and an all weather area referred to as the cage. This has a positive effect on the children's development. Being outdoors offers opportunities for doing things in different ways and on different scales than when indoors. It offers the children the ability to explore, use their senses and be physically active and exuberant. We plan activities and resources for the children to access outdoors that help the children to develop in all areas of learning.

Transition

From Pre-school / Feeder settings

During the summer term prior to a child's entry into the Reception year, the following procedures have been put into place to ensure successful transition.

- All Parents are invited to an induction meeting in school where they receive the New Starters Handbook.
- In the first half of the summer term members of the Reception team go across to the Twinkle Toes Nursery to work with children in their setting.

After half term the children visit the Reception class on a weekly basis. This can be with or without the support of their preschool practitioners as is deemed necessary.

- Children from other feeder settings are invited to four separate visits to the Reception class. These visits take place after the summer half term.
- Members of staff from Reception make visits to other feeder settings. The number of visits will depend on the child's needs and how much information gathering is required in order to support the child's transition.
- Children requiring extra support will have additional visits regardless of their setting. Often these children will have been identified as requiring additional support or are part of the Common Assessment Framework (CAF) process.
- Home visits are arranged to meet the child in their own environment at the end of the summer term before they start school.
- Arranging for children to start school on a part time over the first two weeks of term.

From Reception Class to Key Stage 1

- During the final term in Reception, the EYFS Profile is completed for each child. The Profile provides parents and carers, staff and teachers with a well-rounded picture of a child's knowledge, understanding and abilities, their progress against expected levels, and their readiness for Year 1.

Each child's level of development is assessed against the Early Learning Goals. The profile indicates whether children are meeting expected levels of development, or if they are exceeding expected levels, or not yet reaching expected levels ('emerging'). Any children who Reception staff believe are exceeding expected levels of development are assessed jointly with staff from Year 1 using the moderation guidance provided from Wigan. This moderation assessment involves the Reception Staff and the Y1 teacher working together to moderate and validate these judgements.

Year 1 teachers are given a copy of the Profile report together with a short commentary on each child's skills and abilities in relation to the three key characteristics of effective learning. This informs the dialogue between Reception and Year 1 teachers about each child's stage of development and learning needs and assists with the planning of activities in Year 1.

Reception children visit the Y1 class during the final week of the summer term.
